JOURNAL POLICY

International Journal of Comparative Law and Legal Philosophy (IJOCLLEP) is a peer blind reviewed periodical that provides a dynamic platform for dissemination of ideas on comparative law and philosophy of law. As it is hard, in our contemporary globalized world, to confine developments in law to one jurisdiction and isolate them from another, the Journal is a podium for reports on developments in the field of comparative law from all parts of the world. As also a philosophy of law forum, *IJOCLLEP* provides an opportunity for spread of the results of analysis of transnational legal history and theory, private international law/conflict of laws, and the study of legal systems, cultures, and traditions. The Journal reports debates on and critique of fundamental concepts and principles of law employing pragmatic approach, as it were, to developmental problems. *IJOCLLEP* seeks for papers based on doctrinal or empirical or mixed research methodologies. The Journal is abstracted and indexed with Nigerian Journals Online and Google Scholar. Well researched and original papers on fundamental, topical and relevant subject matters, and case/book reviews are therefore welcome. *IJOCLLEP* now appears three times a year in January, May and September, which articles promptly appear in Google scholar. Submission of manuscripts can be made all through the year.

Guidelines to Contributors

1. Language

The language of the manuscript must be English (British standards).

2. Originality

Articles must be original and must not have been submitted for consideration and publication elsewhere. It is the responsibility of authors to ensure that the material submitted does not infringe copyright.

3. Length of paper

The length of the paper should not exceed 6000 words including tables, figures, references and appendices (if any). Articles should be typed in 1.5 line spacing (footnotes and references should appear in single line spacing) on one side of A4 paper only with wide margins. Authors are urged to write as concisely as possible, but not at the expense of clarity.

4. Title Page

The title page should include: (i) The name(s) of the author(s), (ii) A concise and informative title, (iii) The affiliation(s) and address (es) of the author(s), (iv) The e-mail address, and telephone numbers of the corresponding author.

5. Abstract

Please provide an abstract of 150 to 200 words which must include the objectives of the study, methodology, findings/results, method of data collection and summary of recommendations. The abstract should not contain any undefined abbreviations or unspecified references.

6. Keywords

Please provide 4 to 6 keywords which can be used for indexing purposes.

7. Subdivision of the article

Divide your article into clearly defined and numbered sections. Subsections should be numbered 1, 2. (then 1.1, 1.1.1, 1.1.2), 1.2, etc). The abstract is not included in section numbering.

8. References and Documentation

Author(s) should adhere strictly to Nigerian Association of Law Teachers Uniform Citation and Documentation Standards accessible at www.naltng.org.

9. Names of authors cited in the footnotes should start with initials and end with the surname.

10. Online sources should indicate the site and date of visit.

11. All submissions will undergo double blind peer review and plagiarism check.
